



19 DAYS LUXURY CANADIAN ARCTIC EXPEDITION - REYKJAVIK TO MONTREAL

Few travelers ever reach the folded peaks of Torngat Mountains National Park in remote Labrador, let alone spend three days in this sacred Inuit homeland. Begin in Iceland, cruise Greenland's Prince Christian Sound, then cross to Canada's wild east. Explore the Gulf of St. Lawrence, including UNESCO-listed Anticosti Island, rich in ancient fossils and frequented by whales. Follow the cliff-lined Saguenay Fjord toward Quebec and Montreal.



ITINERARY

Day 1 - Reykjavik

Reykjavik is the world's northernmost capital, an unusually walkable city where colourful corrugated-iron houses line streets that lead between geothermal outdoor pools, the Hallgrímskirkja church, and the Harpa Concert Hall on the waterfront. The city is the base for Iceland's extraordinary natural experiences -- the Northern Lights, the Golden Circle, and the Blue Lagoon all



within easy reach.

Day 2 - Day at sea

Days at sea are the perfect opportunity to relax, unwind, and pursue personal interests, whether visiting the gym, the spa, or simply watching for whales from deck. These blue sea days offer an ideal balance to busy days spent exploring ashore.

Day 3 - Cruise Prince Christian Sound

Connecting the Labrador Sea with the Irminger Sea, Prince Christian Sound stretches 100 kilometres and narrows at times to just 500 metres, its soaring mountains and rock-strewn cliffs creating a landscape seemingly untouched by time. Named after Prince, later King, Christian VII of Denmark, the sound is one of the most dramatic fjord passages in Greenland, framed by icebergs floating serenely through Arctic waters. It is one of the highlights of any voyage through this part of the world.

Day 4 - Day at sea

Day 8 - Hebron Fjord

Hebron Fjord extends 28 miles inland on the Labrador coast and is one of the region's largest fjords. At its mouth, the former Moravian missionary and Inuit community of Hebron has been restored as a National Historic Site, memorialising its controversial closure in 1959 without community consultation. The fjord's waters hold drifting ice floes, and polar bears, seals, and beluga whales may be encountered.

Day 11 - Red Bay, Labrador

Red Bay on Labrador's south coast is a UNESCO World Heritage Site -- the world's most significant Basque whaling station. Dating to the mid-16th century, it is considered the site of the first large-scale whale oil production in history. Underwater excavations have revealed four Basque galleons and smaller vessels, making this one of the most important maritime archaeological sites in the Americas.

Day 12 - Harrington Harbour, Quebec

Connected by boardwalks instead of roads, Harrington Harbour is a one-of-a-kind community on the north shore of the Gulf of St. Lawrence. The whole village runs on wooden walkways, even up the hills, allowing foot traffic, snowmobiles, and quad bikes to pass above the soft, peaty ground and winter's ever-present frosts. Colorful houses look out over the water from the fishing village on the south of the island, while nearby cliffs are painted a bright rusty orange by crustose lichens. This is a working community, and boats still sail out into the St. Lawrence to bring in hauls of halibut, crab, and cod. Quebecois locals have a particular soft spot for the place, as it featured as a filming location in the much-loved film *La Grande Séduction* (*Seducing Doctor Lewis*). Perhaps surprisingly for this part of the world, it's an English-speaking island, having been founded by Newfoundland fishermen.

Day 13 - Baie de la Tour, Anticosti Island

A sweeping arc of pebble beach curves against the forested backdrop of Anticosti Island, at the mouth of the St. Lawrence. Baie de la Tour takes its name from its tower-like cliff -- sheer white limestone terraces capped with pine -- and the bay glows

turquoise on sunny days, while offshore the waters are patrolled by whales and seals. Inland, hiking trails lead through forest where more than a hundred thousand white-tailed deer wander freely, far outnumbering the island's handful of residents. You can explore the canyon where Vaureal Falls plummets, and it's the fossils -- revealing marine life from 447-437 million years ago -- and natural history preserved here that earned Anticosti its UNESCO World Heritage listing in 2023. Pure peace and wild beauty, right at the heart of the river.

Day 14 - Port Menier, Anticosti Island

Day 15 - Havre St. Pierre (Quebec)

Havre St. Pierre overlooks the Mingan Archipelago, whose limestone monoliths have been sculpted by ocean, wind, and ice erosion into towering, precariously balanced rock outcrops. Pods of minke whales may accompany boats weaving between the scattered islands, while eagles soar overhead and puffins nest on sheer cliffs. The boardwalk offers panoramas of the world's largest estuary, which draws blue whales to feed in its krill-rich depths.

Day 16 - Baie-Comeau, Quebec

Located in the Cote-Nord region of the province of Quebec, Canada, the city of Baie-Comeau is nestled on the shores of the Saint Lawrence River near the mouth of the Manicouagan River, and is the seat of Manicouagan Regional County Municipality. The city is comprised of two urban centres, Baie-Comeau proper and Hauterive. The landscape of the Baie-Comeau region has been shaped by glacial retreats and other natural phenomena. Important geological features include the Manicouagan and St. Lawrence rivers in the Manicouagan-Uapishka World Biosphere Reserve, and the immense Manicouagan crater, which was

formed by a meteorite. The oldest part of Baie-Comeau is the Old Post, or Vieux-Poste, an area near the mouth of the Amedee River. In 1889, the Saint-Eugene-de-Manicouagan Mission was founded by Eudists, and the first sawmill in the Cote-Nord region was built in 1898. In 1916, Route 138 was extended to Saint-Eugene-de-Manicouagan and in 1929, its post office opened with the English name of Comeau Bay. Eastern Baie-Comeau was founded in 1936 with the construction of a paper mill. The region's burgeoning timber, pulp and paper industries prompted remarkable growth, and the town of Baie-Comeau was incorporated the following year. In 1950, the village of Saint-Eugene-de-Manicouagan was incorporated as the Municipality of Hauterive. In 1982, Hauterive was merged into Baie-Comeau. As a result of its deep-water seaport and access to forestry, energy and mining in northeast Canada, Baie-Comeau combines sustainable industrial development with a thriving natural ecosystem. In fact, few others cities around the world possess a major industrial complex at the heart of a global reserve like the World Reserve Biosphere of Manicouagan-Uapishka. The Baie-Comeau region also boasts engineering masterpieces in the realm of hydroelectricity, including the Jean-Lesage Generating Station, Manic 2 Central Dam, Manic 5 Generating Station and Daniel Johnson Dam. The development of the Baie-Comeau region was bolstered by the industrialization of modern Quebec by means of its natural resources. The presence of the Saint Lawrence River, forestry, the creation of saw and paper mills, and the emergence of a world-class aluminum smelter all led to the expansion of the territory. Baie-Comeau and its environs are ideally-suited for a variety of popular inland and coastal excursions. Its proximity to the confluence of the Manicouagan and St. Lawrence rivers in the Manicouagan-Uapishka World Biosphere Reserve offers easy

access to a vast natural paradise replete with exceptional geological phenomena, incredibly rich wildlife and forest habitats. Explore the exquisite coast and crystal-clear waters teeming with marine mammals and undersea treasures whilst boating, kayaking, scuba diving, fishing, and hunting. In the summer, an abundance of activities include golf, cycling and hiking trails, beaches, parks, flight-seeing, and more. Winter is no less exciting; the region's abundant snowfall is ideal for downhill skiing at the Centre de ski du Mont-Tibasse, and cross-country skiing and ski-skating at Sentier Norfond and Les Sentiers de la Riviere Amedee. Due to its compact size, Baie-Comeau can be easily explored in just a single day.

[Day 17 - Cruise Saguenay River \(Quebec\)](#)

Dissecting the most southerly ice-age fjord in the northern hemisphere, the Saguenay River rolls through dense forest before emptying into the St. Lawrence, slicing through three National Parks. Wildlife ranges from Atlantic salmon and moose to black bears, wolves, and harbour seals, and where the cool Saguenay meets the warmer St. Lawrence, conditions attract pods of blue whales, belugas, and minke whales. The precipitous cliff edge of Cap Trinite is among the fjord's most celebrated sights.

[Day 18 - Quebec City](#)

Quebec City is North America's most European-feeling city -- a UNESCO World Heritage Site where 400-year-old fortifications, cobblestone streets, and the iconic Chateau Frontenac rise above the St Lawrence River. Samuel de Champlain founded New France here in 1608, and the city's French-speaking character, boardwalk cannon batteries, and Old Town neighbourhood have survived intact into the 21st century.



Day 19 - Montreal

A French-speaking city of festivals, food markets, and cobblestone streets, Montreal wears its European heritage with Canadian confidence. Mount Royal rises at the city's centre, offering panoramic views over a skyline shaped by centuries of history, while the underground city, vibrant neighbourhoods, and St. Lawrence waterfront ensure there is no shortage of ways to spend the day.

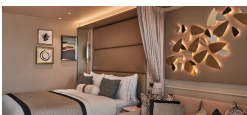
